- I. Date July 10, 2009 Subject John Calvin Grade Level 9 Teacher L. Lapp
- II. Main Focus: Students will learn about John Calvin and the roots of Calvinism in Geneva.
- III. Objectives - Understand how Calvinism began and flourished in Geneva. See how Geneva was a place of refuge, illustrate the importance of humanism and the vernacular word in the Reformation movement. See how the Protestant Reformation sparked the English Reformation, although it had political motives more than social.
