To give some <u>idea</u> of the ancient <u>discipline</u>, the penalties attached to graver crimes are cited here from the English and <u>Irish Penitentials</u>. For <u>stealing</u>, Cummian prescribes that a <u>layman</u> shall do one year of penance; a <u>cleric</u>, two; a <u>subdeacon</u> three; a <u>deacon</u>, four; a <u>priest</u>, five; a <u>bishop</u>, six. For <u>murder</u> or <u>perjury</u>, the penance lasted three, five, six, seven, ten or twelve years according to the criminal's rank. <u>Theodore</u> commands that if any one <u>leave the Catholic Church</u>, join the heretics, and <u>induce others to do the same</u>, he shall, in case he repent, do penance for twelve years. For the <u>perjurer</u> who swears by the <u>Church</u>, the Gospel, or the <u>relics</u> of the <u>saints</u>, Egbert prescribes seven or eleven years of penance. <u>Usury</u> entailed three years; <u>infanticide</u>, fifteen; <u>idolatry</u> or <u>demon-worship</u>, ten. Then Peter approaching asked him, "Lord, if my brother sins against me, how often must I forgive him? As many as seven times?" Jesus answered, "I say to you, not seven times but seventy-seven times. That is why the kingdom of heaven may be likened to a king who decided to settle accounts with his servants.

When he began the accounting, a debtor was brought before him who owed him a huge amount. Since he had no way of paying it back, his master ordered him to be sold, along with his wife, his children, and all his property, in payment of the debt. At that, the servant fell down, did him homage, and said, 'Be patient with me, and I will pay you back in full.' Moved with compassion the master of that servant let him go and forgave him the loan. When that servant had left, he found one of his fellow servants who owed him a much smaller amount. He seized him and started to choke him, demanding, 'Pay back what you owe.' Falling to his knees, his fellow servant begged him, 'Be patient with me, and I will pay you back.' But he refused. Instead, he had him put in prison until he paid back the debt. Now when his fellow servants saw what had happened, they were deeply disturbed, and went to their master and reported the whole affair. His master summoned him and said to him, 'You wicked servant! I forgave you your entire debt because you begged me to. Should you not have had pity on your fellow servant, as I had pity on you?'

Then in anger his master handed him over to the torturers until he should pay back the whole debt. So will my heavenly Father do to you, unless each of you forgives his brother from his heart."

Matthew 18: 15 - 18

"If your brother sins against you, go and tell him his fault between you and him alone. If he listens to you, you have won over your brother. If he does not listen, take one or two others along with you, so that 'every fact may be established on the testimony of two or three witnesses.' If he refuses to listen to them, tell the church. If he refuses to listen even to the church, then treat him as you would a Gentile or a tax collector. Amen, I say to you, whatever you bind on earth shall be bound in heaven, and whatever you loose on earth shall be loosed in heaven.
